

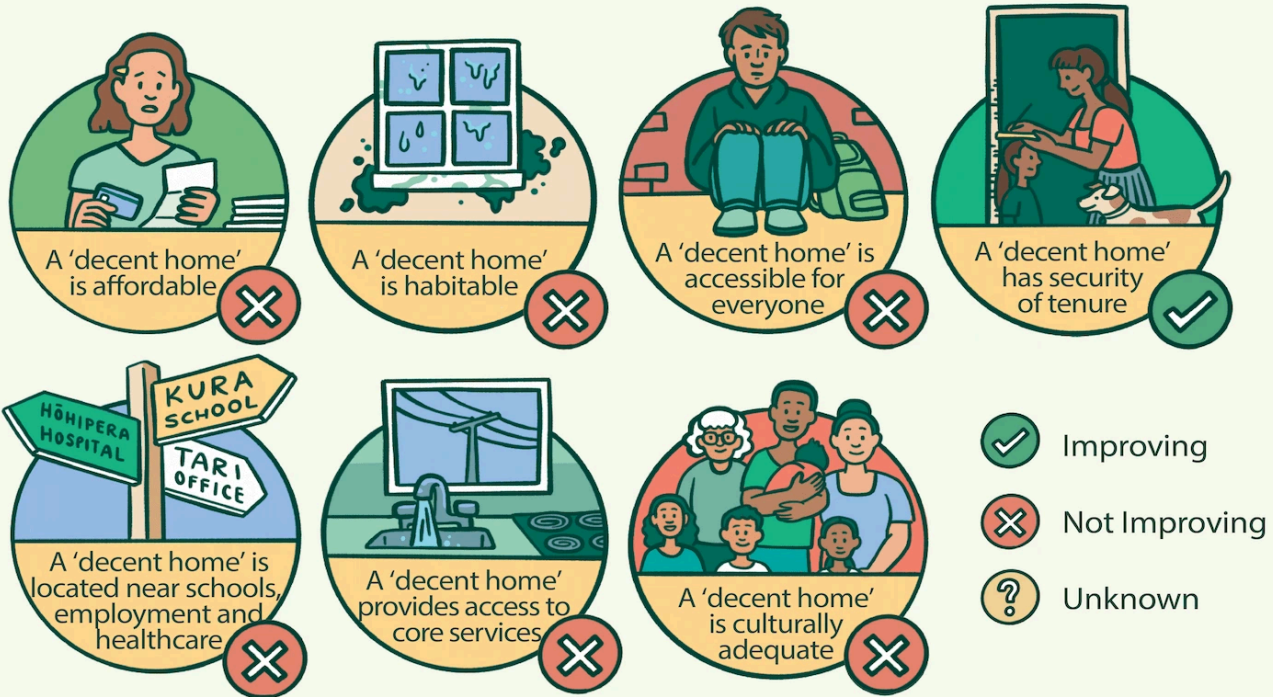
**Right to a Decent Home**

Measuring Progress on the right to a decent home

Measuring Progress uses a selection of indicators to track progress in how the right to a decent home, including the obligations established through te Tiriti o Waitangi, is being realised in Aotearoa. The indicators measure progress across seven 'decency' principles outlined by the United Nations.

RIGHT TO A DECENT HOME: MEASURING PROGRESS

To achieve our housing rights, these things need to get better over time – they shouldn't get worse or stay the same.



The [Guidelines to the right to a decent home grounded on Te Tiriti o Waitangi](#) identified the need to measure the progressive realisation of the right to a decent home - in order to hold those with obligations under the right to a decent home accountable.

The data provided here was released between 2022 and 2023 by the Commission with support from Stats NZ, as part of the Housing Inquiry.
